
## NEXT GENERATION

Like many of the city's beloved restaurants, the historic 101 Coffee Shop—long a low-key mainstay for industry folks—shut down during the pandemic. But to the delight of Angelenos everywhere, Echo Park-based Clark Street Bread swooped in to save the day. Now named the Clark Street Diner, the reimagined cafe looks almost identical to the original, but with some important updates. "We definitely didn't want to disturb the design or the diner menu too much. We wanted to focus mostly on making diner classics but thinking about the ingredients in a modern way," says Clark Street Bread's Zach Hall, who made sure to keep some of the diner's original staff in place. "We were excited by the idea to work with people who were and are a part of the fabric of the diner itself," he explains. Known for her bold commentary on consumerist society and popular culture, the L.A.-based artist—in collaboration with LACMA, MoMA and the Art Institute of Chicago—has assembled 33 works that span four decades, including videos from the 1980s, audio soundscapes, vinyl-wrapped rooms and more. "Barbara Kruger's art, and her dialogue with advertising and propaganda and human nature, is 'essential reading' for anyone who wants insight into our modern culture," says CEO and Wallis Annenberg Director of LACMA Michael Govan. "We are thrilled that Kruger's influential and distinctive visual language will take over LACMA's campus in March, including new works that will be integrated into our buildings and onto our facades, bringing the artist's work out to the street and to a wider public."
